<p>Both of my grandmothers were quilters and it always amazed me how they could take insignificant pieces of colorful fabrics and make such gorgeous quilts that also served a very serious purpose. P.E.O. is made up of many women of different backgrounds and different approaches to what we do, but as a whole we are strong and serve a useful purpose, much more than we could do as individuals. Each element in P.E.O. adds to the beauty and strength of our "quilt," each member, each local chapter, each State chapter and each of our philanthropies. However, the thread that binds our quilt is the love and support of all our sisters.</p>

<p>P.E.O. was begun by seven teenagers who had what turned out to be a wonderful vision. Through their love for each other they passed to all of us a strong, vital and supportive organization. I believe that we served as good stewards of Alabama's P.E.O. voyage. Membership continued to grow during this time.			
Briefly – what does P.E.O. mean to you?			
<p>When I became a P.E.O., I can truthfully say I did not fully appreciate what that meant. However, within two years, when our son died suddenly, I learned just how truly loving and supportive our sisters are. Chapter W literally closed around our family and with the added support of other friends, carried us through what was the worst time of our lives. Since that time, P.E.O. has offered me many opportunities for personal growth and I hope that I have been able to live up to the expectations of my sisters. I have always been active in the community and in many organizations, but I would give up everything before I would give up P.E.O. I am so grateful that God led Katie Scott and Chapter W to think that I was P.E.O. material. What a wonderful gift!</p>			
Briefly – can you provide a personal philosophy about philanthropy in P.E.O.?			
<p>P.E.O. philanthropies allow us to make a substantial difference in the lives of many women rather than a few if we were doing it as individuals. While serving on the ELF board, I came to understand how very badly many women want an education but don't have the resources needed to achieve their goal. Many</p>			

of them are working several jobs as well as going to school. The difference our loans, grants and scholarships make can be huge, sometimes only by validating what they doing.
